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Introduction

The files of the Classification, Mail and File Unit in the Criminal Division, Department of Justice consist of (1) records created by the division in carrying out the Department's responsibilities in matters arising under the laws of the United States and in which legal action taken or considered, and (2) records created by the Department and administrative matters relating to the Department and its various subordinate units and to the offices of United States Attorneys.

The files of the Classification, Mail and File Unit of the Criminal Division are arranged by a subject-numeric system that uses numerical file designations usually made

	<p>up of several parts. The primary classes, now numbering some 192, are usually identified with Federal laws or administrative or other subject titles. The secondary classes or sub-number, usually identify particular judicial districts, although this sequence is sometimes varied to include certain commodity or other related subject matter. A third sequence of numbers is used to identify each file folder which usually contains documents pertaining to particular cases that arise within a given district.</p> <p>This schedule provides for the disposal of the records comprising certain subject classes of the Classification, Mail and File Unit as follows:</p> <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Records Analysis Report</u></p> <p style="text-align: center;"><u>General Disposal Justification</u></p> <p>1. <u>General Nature of Case Files.</u></p> <p>The records that are accumulated under the subject classes covered by this schedule pertain to large numbers of routine legal actions generally filed against private citizens and a limited number of corporations. Action on these cases are normally handled by the U. S. Attorney for the district wherein the violation occurs. Only a small percentage of these cases are appealed from the district. Many are settled by pleas of guilty, plea bargaining or are closed because of insufficient evidence to prosecute, other convictions, etc. Because of these actions, the Criminal Division exercises only minimum supervision and almost all are direct referral cases from the investigating agency to the offices of the U. S. Attorneys. Once these cases have been closed, their value for long term administrative purposes ceases.</p> <p>2. <u>Duplicate Documents.</u></p> <p>A more complete account of actions filed in connection with these classes of cases can be found among the records of the U. S. Attorneys and the Courts. The Court records are retained permanently; however, portions of the U. S. Attorneys files are disposed of when ten years old.</p> <p>3. <u>Reference Material.</u></p> <p>A substantial part of the material under consideration in these classes consists of transcripts of court proceedings, copies of investigations, photostats of exhibits, briefs,</p>		

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	<p>etc, which are maintained strictly for reference convenience in supervising the processing of cases thru the office of the U. S. Attorney and the Court system. The material is fragmentary and upon close of the case becomes superfluous to the Division's needs. This is particularly true of appellate cases.</p> <p>4. <u>Historical Research.</u></p> <p>The bulk of the files comprising the subjects under consideration lacks the controversy necessary to stimulate the interest of historians. The fragmentary nature of these classes reduces their value to historians as documentation for the preparation of scholarly publications.</p> <p>5. <u>Reference Use.</u></p> <p>Since the Justice case files have been stored at the Federal Archives Records Center at Suitland, Maryland, there have been a number of occasions where we had to recall a certain number of cases in these classes for reference in other legal cases.</p>		

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	<p align="center"><u>Part I - General Instructions for Disposal</u></p> <p>A. Closed correspondence and enclosure files retired to the Federal Archives and Records Center (FARC) prior to January 1, 1980, exclusive of records covered by Classes 71, 146, and 158.*</p> <p>1. Selected correspondence files of significant historic value.</p> <p>Closed cases cited by name in a previous edition of the <u>Annual Report of the Attorney General</u>.</p> <p><u>Disposition.</u> PERMANENT. Offer to NARS upon expiration of individual class retention periods referenced in the following Part II - Specific Justification for Disposal.</p> <p><u>Procedure.</u> The Criminal Division shall prepare a list of all of its cases cited in <u>Annual Reports of the Attorney General</u>, 1941-1979, reference accession and box location numbers, and submit the list to the FARC via Standard Form 258, Request to Transfer - Approval and Receipt of Records. FARC shall segregate the correspondence files for these cases for permanent retention. These will be transferred to NARS after the expiration of the retention periods cited in Part II.</p> <p><u>Estimated volume:</u> 74 cubic feet.</p> <p>2. Unselected correspondence and related enclosure files.</p> <p><u>Disposition:</u> Destroy after expiration of individual class retention periods referenced in the following Part II.</p> <p>3. Enclosure files (when sent to FARC separate from the correspondence files).</p> <p><u>Disposition:</u> Destroy 2 years after expiration of individual class retention periods referenced in the following Part II. For purposes of applying this schedule, the date of shipment to FARC shall be used in place of the closing date for the case.</p>		

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	<p>B. Closed correspondence and enclosure files retired to FARC after January 1, 1980.*</p> <p>1. Selected correspondence files of significant historic value.</p> <p>Prior to transfer of closed files to FARC, the Criminal Division shall select, segregate and designate files of significant historic value according to one or more of the following criteria:</p> <p>(a) A case can be regarded as significant in terms of its legal impact on statutes, rules or regulations or law enforcement policies.</p> <p>(b) An investigation or case can be regarded as significant in terms of actual or potential breakdown of public order (civil disturbances).</p> <p>(c) An investigation or case can be regarded as significant in terms of intensity of public interest, expressed by (1) a demonstrated interest of a congressional committee or the Executive Office of the President, or (2) a high degree of national media attention.</p> <p><u>Disposition:</u> PERMANENT. Transfer to FARC one year after close of case (i.e. concluded upon a verdict, discontinuance, dismissal, quashing, completed litigation or appeals, and/or finalization of collection of fines). Offer to NARS 25 years after close of case.</p> <p><u>Procedure:</u> Correspondence files selected by the Criminal Division for permanent retention shall be listed individually by case name on Standard Form 135, Records Transmittal and Receipt, and boxed separately from unselected or general files for transmittal to FARC.</p> <p><u>Estimated annual volume:</u> 5 cubic feet.</p> <p>2. Unselected correspondence files and all enclosure files.</p> <p><u>Disposition:</u> Transfer to FARC one year after close of case. Destroy after expiration of individual class retention periods referenced in the following Part II, unless the case involves a sentence which is longer.</p>		

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	<p><u>Procedure:</u> Unselected correspondence files and all enclosure files shall be boxed according to disposition date as follows:</p> <p>(a) Files involving a sentence of less than the retention period cited in Part II shall be transferred to the FARC one year after the close of the case. These records will be destroyed after the end of the retention period</p> <p>(b) Files involving sentences longer than the normal retention period cited in Part II shall be transferred, separately from other files, to the FARC one year after the case is closed. These records will be destroyed after the termination of the sentence. To facilitate disposal of these files, they must be boxed for transferral according to the year in which the sentence is scheduled to terminate.</p> <p>(c) No box may contain records having more than one destruction date.</p> <p>(d) Enclosure files shall be transferred with the related closed correspondence files.</p> <p>C. General files retired to FARC prior to Jan. 1, 1980.*</p> <p>1. All other general files, again those identified by an "0" sub-number somewhere after the standard primary class number (other than 01, 012, 016 in C above), arranged chronologically.</p> <p><u>Disposition:</u> Transfer to FARC as space requirements and frequency of use dictate. Destroy after 10 years.</p> <p><u>Procedure:</u> The above general files shall be boxed separately from all other files according to the year in which they will be destroyed with only one destruction date per box.</p>

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<u>Part II - Specific Justification for Disposal</u>			
1.	<p><u>Class - 12 Narcotics Act</u></p> <p>In general, the file includes correspondence, pleadings, etc., relating to cases instituted under the Controlled Substances Act (21 U.S.C. 801 et seq.) and the Controlled Substances Import and Export Act (21 U.S.C. 951 et seq.) as well as to proceedings under the Narcotic Addict Rehabilitation Act. In essence, such files relate to investigations, litigation, and other matters pertaining to narcotics, marijuana, and other dangerous drugs. Examples of materials found in such files are: copies of investigative reports compiled by the Drug Enforcement Administration; copies of indictments, memoranda of law, motions filed in court, court decisions, and appellate briefs; Department memoranda dealing with the appeal of adverse court decisions; correspondence with United States Attorneys concerning questions of law, policy and procedure; materials dealing with wiretap applications, immunity requests, witness protection requests, and electronic surveillance inquiries; comments on proposed legislation; and correspondence dealing with drug-related inquiries from citizens and from members of Congress.</p> <p>Dispose 15 years after close of case.</p>		
2.	<p><u>Class - 13 National Defense Act</u></p> <p>In general, the file consists of nothing since 1950 and appears to be inactive.</p> <p>Dispose 10 years after close of case.</p>		
3.	<p><u>Class - 15 Theft from Interstate Commerce</u></p> <p>Covers theft of goods from interstate and foreign shipments Title 18, (Sec. 659); employee thefts of common carriers funds; and breaking any seal or lock or entering the facilities of a common carrier with intent to steal, Title 182, (Sec. 2117).</p> <p>In general, the file consists of investigative reports and routine correspondence with United States Attorneys and with federal agencies concerned relating to violations of the nature described above.</p>		

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4.	<p>Dispose 10 years after close of case.</p> <p><u>Class - 17 War Risk Insurance</u></p>		
5.	<p>Dispose 10 years after close of case unless transferred to FRC custody before July 1, 1975, and not identifiable as Criminal Division case files (dispose 15 years after close of case).</p> <p><u>Class - 25 Selective Service Act; Selective Service Habeas Corpus; Soldiers and Sailors Civil Relief</u></p> <p>Records pertain to violations of the Military Selective Service Act, or to habeas corpus petitions brought by military personnel seeking discharge from the service because of conscientious objection to military service. They are frequently appealed. However, they are of little or no historical interest.</p> <p>In general, the file consists of investigative reports and routine correspondence with Selective Service Boards, United States Attorneys and federal investigative agencies concerned relating to violations of the nature described above.</p>		
6.	<p>Dispose 10 years after close of case unless transferred to FRC custody before July 1, 1975, and not identifiable as Criminal Division case files (dispose 15 years after close of case).</p> <p><u>Class - 27. (SEE NEXT PAGE)</u></p>		
7.	<p><u>Class - 28 Copyright Act</u></p> <p>Files under this classification contain allegations, FBI investigative reports, search warrants, information, indictments, court orders, briefs, other court pleadings and papers, citizen and congressional correspondence, Departmental memoranda, and other documents concerning violations of the criminal provisions of the Copyright Act 17 U.S.C. 104, and other copyright matters. Many of these papers are kept in the files of the United States Attorney's office where the investigation takes place.</p> <p>Dispose 10 years after close of case unless transferred to FRC custody before July 1, 1975, and not identifiable as Criminal Division case files (dispose 15 years after close of case).</p>		

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6.	<p><u>Class - 27 Patents</u></p> <p>Covers fraud against the Patent Office 35 U.S.C. (292) and 35 U.S.C. (33). This class is primarily the responsibility of the Civil Division although the Criminal Division has an interest through the above two criminal statutes.</p> <p>Dispose 10 years after close of case.</p>		

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8.	<p><u>Class - 29 National Banking Act</u></p> <p>These cases involved misapplication or embezzlement of the funds of National Banks or banks insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation by officers, agents or employees of such banks, false entries in the books or records of said banks and false statements made by the customers of said banks to influence their actions. These matters are referred directly to United States Attorneys by the FDIC, the Comptroller of the Currency or the Federal Reserve Board and investigated by the F.B.I. While we receive copies of all referrals at the present time, we only receive investigative reports where the amount involved is over \$50,000. In view of the direct referral procedure there is little documentation in the Department file other than the original referral in 90% of the matters, in the remainder F.B.I. reports will be included in addition to a review memorandum where prosecution has been declined. In not more than 5% of the matters there may be additional material when the United States Attorney has sought advice as to prosecution, trial or appeal.</p> <p>Dispose 10 years after close of case.</p>		
9.	<p><u>Class - 30 Quarantine (ex. RR-Virus)</u></p> <p>These files are comprised of referrals from the Department of Agriculture and related correspondence and investigative reports in connection with alleged violations of the Contagious Disease Prevention Act (21 U.S.C. 112, 120, 122), together with proposed forms of informations and indictments, court papers, and other documents, many of which are copies of files in the offices of the litigating United States Attorneys.</p> <p>Dispose 10 years after close of case.</p>		
10.	<p><u>Class - 35 Civil Service Act</u></p> <p>Covers interference with Civil Service examinations (Sec. 1917), perjury arising in connection with Loyalty Board dismissals (no longer current), matters concerning overtime leave and holiday compensation and veterans civil service claims involving fraud.</p> <p>In general, the file consists of investigative reports, routine correspondence with the Civil Service Commission</p>		

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	<p>and United States Attorneys relating to violations of the nature described above.</p> <p>Dispose 10 years after close of case.</p>		
11.	<p><u>Class - 36 Mails to Defraud</u></p> <p>The United States Postal Service makes criminal referrals directly to the appropriate United States Attorneys, with copies of the referral material to the Department in selective instances. The Department's file would consist of a copy of the referral letter, together with any attached exhibits, supplemental investigative reports in some instances, correspondence, either from the public, or between the Criminal Division and the United States Attorney. Declination of prosecution are not reviewed in the Department except upon a specific request from the Postal Service. No civil proceedings are instituted by the Department of Justice in connection with these referrals.</p> <p>Dispose 10 years after close of case.</p>		
12.	<p><u>Class - 38 Naturalization</u></p> <p>Files under this classification contain information on cases, relating to expatriation, naturalization, and revocation of naturalization. Most of the litigation material is also in files of the United States Attorneys. Information on these cases might also be found in the files of the Department of State, of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Some cases may be included among the records of both the Immigration and Naturalization Service and the State Department. None of these sources is apt to have a complete record on the case, however. Information on these cases is often vital in determining citizenship claims of descendants of the persons involved.</p> <p>Dispose 50 years after close of case.</p>		
13.	<p><u>Class - 39 Immigration</u></p> <p>Files under this classification contain information on cases relating to exclusion or deportation of aliens, applications for various benefits or relief provided by the immigration laws, criminal offenses and civil fine</p>		

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	<p>proceedings under those laws, and immigration bond proceedings. Most of this information is also in the United States Attorneys' files. Our files, in addition, contain much information relating to interagency, intra-Divisional and intra-Departmental communication. These cases, particularly deportation cases, are often of long duration and recurrent.</p> <p>Dispose 20 years after close of case.</p>		
14.	<p><u>Class - 40 Passport and Visa</u></p> <p>Files under this classification contain material relating to cases involving consular refusals of visas, criminal offenses involving United States passports and visas, and miscellaneous information relating to the use or misuse of such passports and visas. Citizenship cases of expatriation or revocation of naturalization, such as discussed under the 38 classification, may also be in these files if United States passports were involved. Most of the material on litigation and some of the miscellaneous information relating to passports and visas is in the files of the Department of State.</p> <p>Dispose 10 years after close of case unless transferred to FRC custody before July 1, 1975, and not identifiable as Criminal Division case files (dispose 15 years after close of case).</p>		
15.	<p><u>Class - 41 Transportation of Explosives, Fireworks, Dangerous Articles</u></p> <p>Covers unlawful transportation of explosives, radioactive materials or etiologic agents, 18 U.S.C. (Sec. 832), false or deceptive making of such dangerous materials for shipment, 18 U.S.C. (Sec. 833); violation of interstate Commerce Commission regulations for safe transportation of dangerous materials, 18 U.S.C. (Sec. 834); transportation of fireworks into a state which prohibits their sale or use; interference with foreign commerce by fire or explosives, 18 U.S.C. (Sec. 1364); carrying or possessing explosives, dangerous weapons or other dangerous materials aboard certain vessels, 18 U.S.C. (Sec. 2277, 2278 and 46 U.S.C. 170, 391a); and unlawful importation, manufacture, distribution and storage of explosive materials, 18 U.S.C. (Sec. 842, 843, 844).</p>		

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	<p>In general, file consists of investigative reports, routine correspondence with United States Attorneys, I.C.C. and Department of Transportation relating to violations of the nature described above.</p> <p>Dispose 10 years after close of case.</p>		
16.	<p><u>Class - 42 Desertion from Armed Forces of U.S. - Harboring such Deserters</u></p> <p>Cover enticing desertion from the Armed Forces and harboring of deserters (10 U.S.C. 808).</p> <p>In general, file consists of onvestigative reports, routine correspondence with United States Attorneys and federal agencies relating to violations of the nature described above.</p> <p>Dispose 10 years after close of case.</p>		
17.	<p><u>Class - 45 Crime on High Seas</u></p> <p>Covers misconduct of ship officers, 18 U.S.C. (Sec. 1115) piracy and privateering, 18 U.S.C. (Sec. 1651-1661) seduction of female passenger, 18 U.S.C. (Sec. 2198), stowaways on vessels or aircraft, 18 U.S.C. (Sec. 2199); destruction of vessels ; 18 U.S.C. (Sec. 2271-2276) and boarding vessels before arrival, 18 U.S.C. (Sec. 2279).</p> <p>In general, file consists of investigative reports, routine correspondence with United States Attorneys and federal agencies relting to violations of the nature described above.</p> <p>Dispose 10 years after close of case.</p>		
18.	<p><u>Class - 46 Fraud Against the Government</u></p> <p>The Department of Justice receives from each department and agency of Government, as those terms are defined in 18 U.S.C. 6, a reference for prosecutive evaluation of those instances of suspected malfeasance or corruption occuring in the programs they administer. Additionally, allegations of irregularities may be received from private citizens of the Congress. With the exception of inquiries</p>

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	<p>conducted overseas by the military, stateside investigation is the primary responsibility of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Whatever the nature of the program, grant in aid, contract of assistance, loan, subsidy, or recruitment of personnel, its criminal potential is determined by the United States Attorney.</p> <p>Aside from the initial receipt of the complaint, the substance of the Department file is reports of subsequent investigation. Where prosecution is initiated the file may also include motion papers, briefs and perhaps, pertinent opinions as well as correspondence with the United States Attorneys.</p> <p>After there has been a disposition of the criminal aspects of the case, it would seem that retention for a ten year period would afford ample opportunity for resolution of any ancillary civil issues or disposition of any inquiry made by a party in interest.</p> <p>Dispose 10 years after close of case unless transferred to FRC custody before July 1, 1975, and not identifiable as Criminal Division case files (dispose 15 years after close of case).</p>		
19.	<p><u>Class - 47 Impersonation of Federal Officer</u></p> <p>Covers fraudulent use of various emblems and impersonations, 18 U.S.C. (Sec. 706, 707, 911-917).</p> <p>In general, file consists of copies of investigative reports and routine correspondence with United States Attorneys and with federal agencies relating to violations of the nature described above.</p> <p>Dispose 10 years after close of case.</p>		
20.	<p><u>Class - 48 Postal Violations</u></p> <p>Covers unlawful carriage, delay and obstruction of mail, 18 U.S.C. (Sec. 1691-1703) theft, burglary and robbery of</p>		

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	<p>mail; 18 U.S.C. (Sec. 288, 1704-1713, 2114-2116); non-mailable matter, 18 U.S.C. (Sec. 1714-1718); employee defalcations and other frauds on the Postal Service, 18 U.S.C. (Sec. 1720-1734).</p> <p>In general, file consist of copies of investigative reports and routine correspondence with United States Attorneys and federal agencies relating to violations of the nature described above.</p> <p>Dispose 10 years after close of case.</p>		
21.	<p><u>Class - 49 Bankruptcy</u></p> <p>These matters involve, primarily, concealments, transfers in contemplation of bankruptcy and false statements in bankruptcy proceedings and are referred directly to the United States Attorney or the F.B.I. by referees, trustees, receivers or creditors. Thus the Department files consist mainly of referrals and F.B.I. reports in addition to memoranda reviewing declination of prosecution. To a minor extent there are letters to United States Attorneys who seek advice of trial prosecution and appeal.</p> <p>Dispose 10 years after close of case.</p>
